KNOWING JESUS... MAKING JESUS KNOWN!



ON May 9th, we will be celebrating Ascension Day and at our Ascension Day service, we often have different prayer activities and at the end of it we hand out **Thy Kingdom Come** booklets.

THESE booklets encourage us to pray for 5 people to come to know Jesus from the time of Ascension to Pentecost.

As this is a great time of prayer, I will share with you some of my thoughts on prayer, explained under the following three headings.

The importance of prayer

There are many reasons why prayer is important and vital to our lives.

To begin with, prayer connects us with God. Throughout the bible, God tries to connect with His people and have a relationship with them. Through prayer, we can speak to God and bring our concerns and fears to him. We can also bring our celebrations to God as we give thanks for the good things that happen to us. Therefore, when we pray, we are staying connected to God and we are also building our relationship with him.

Secondly, prayer is important because it helps us to focus on God. Our lives often become extremely busy for many different reasons.

When we take time to stop and pray, we are getting away from the business of life and focusing on God.

When life becomes busy, stressful, or even difficult, it can be easy to focus on all the negative things around us. By doing so, we often lose track of who we are and who God is. However, through prayer, we turn our focus to God, the one who created all things and as we focus on him, we are reminded that we are his creation and that he loves us with an everlasting love.

Finally, prayer is important because it brings us inner peace. Throughout my life, I have found that there are moments when I cannot control what is happening around me. I remember when I was struggling to get my visa to remain in England. At that point in my life I felt no control over the situation, and this was a frightening feeling. However, in the midst of this fear and uncertainty, I found peace in prayer.

Each time I prayed, I handed over to God all that I was feeling and experiencing which felt like a huge weight off my shoulders. At the end of each prayer, I felt at peace because I knew that regardless of my visa outcome, God still loved me, and He was with me.

These are a few reasons why prayer is important and each one of us will have our own experiences with prayer which I would encourage us to share with each other. By doing so, we can all learn about how important and vital prayer is.

The challenges of prayer

Although prayer is important and has many benefits, it can be challenging at times to pray.

Firstly, prayer can be challenging because we may feel like we do not have the right words to say, or we might not know what the proper way to pray is.



I have found that the key to overcoming this challenge is in the way that we view God and the way we view Jesus. Not only do I view Jesus as the Saviour, the High Priest and the Messiah, I also view Jesus as my best friend who knows everything about me. One of the most famous scriptures that describes the way God knows us is found in the Gospel of Luke. Chapter 12 verse 7 reads,

'But even the hairs of your head are all counted.'

Therefore, when I pray, I speak to Him as a close friend who I respect and love. On those days when I have no words, I take comfort in the fact that He knows my feelings and everything else I may be facing on that day.

Another reason prayer can be challenging is simply because of the mistakes we make throughout our lives. Sometimes, the wrong things that we do and the mistakes we make carry with them the feelings of guilt and unworthiness. This issue is something I have managed to become better at after struggling with it for a few years.

In the past, when I made mistakes, I often would not pray for days due to feelings of unworthiness and guilt.

As I began studying the bible and finding out about the power of God's love, I realised that nothing can ever separate us from the love of God.

This helped me to realise that even past mistakes are small when it comes to the greatness of God's love.

Indeed, none of us are perfect and we have made and will continue to make mistakes, but God still desires to hear from us.

The journey of prayer

As we celebrate Ascension Day and as we focus on prayer, my hope for us is that we may begin to see prayer as a journey which lasts for a lifetime. Often on a journey, we may feel tired, or we may go through sudden unexpected turns and corners, but our focus is to continue travelling.

I believe that this is like prayer – though we may feel like we do not have the right words to say at times and though we may feel unworthy at times, our focus is to continue praying.

In the Gospel of Luke chapter 18, Jesus tells the parable of the persistent widow. The reason He tells this parable is explained in the scripture which states: 'Then Jesus told them a parable about their need to pray always and not lose heart.'

This parable and these words encourage us to keep praying even when things are tough.

So, whatever life throws at us and whatever the future holds, may we strive to find time to talk to God and may the Holy Spirit grant us strength to keep on travelling along our prayer journey.



Was the wind behind him helping him along but whipping hair into his face?


Or perhaps against him pushing him back so he had to be all the more determined to walk the road to death.

Diocesan Synod

THE Diocesan Synod considers the affairs of the Diocese as they arise, (a) nationally, from General Synod; (b) locally, from parishes and deaneries; and (c) internally, regarding policy and finance.

It consists of elected, nominated, coopted and ex-officio members of three houses: Bishops, Clergy and Laity.

The Bishop presides and shares the chair with the Vice-Presidents, ie: the Chair of the House of Clergy and the Chair of the House of Laity.

Diocesan Synod has the following statutory functions:

- To consider matters concerning the Church of England and to make provision for such matters in relation to the Diocese, and to consider and express their opinion on any other matters of religious or public interest (not including doctrinal matters);
- To advise the Bishop on any matters on which they may consult Synod; and
- To consider and express their opinion on any matters referred to them by the General Synod, and in particular to approve or disapprove provisions referred to them by the General Synod under Article 8 of the Constitution

If you would like to be considered for Diocesan Synod, please speak to Lisa by 15th May.

Following this, a formal application will have to be made, then there is an election of 14 members of the House of Clergy and 12 members of the House Laity of the Diocesan Synod which will be held in Kingswood and South Gloucestershire Deanery between 7–24 June 2024.
