## Jesus is... 'Joy to the World'

WE'VE marked the beginning of a new Church year by starting again in Advent, the first season of the liturgical calendar.

LIKE a hapless Black Friday shopper thrown to the ground by the crazed masses surging around them, Advent usually gets trampled in our culture's mad rush towards Christmas, and Christians are by no means immune to this trend.

Advent is one of the richest times of the church year, and we miss out on that richness when we barrel straight for Christmas as soon as the Advent Calendars are up. Advent is all the more needful in our time when Christmas is awash with cultural significance that has little to do with the baby in the manger; it helps us to see through all the clutter and noise that has accumulated at this time of the year to the true hope and joy of Christmas.

I discovered recently that one of our beloved Christmas carols is in fact not a Christmas carol at all.

The song is so familiar to us, and its words are so well known that we probably haven't noticed that the song does not include a single detail from the story of Jesus' birth: no stable, no shepherds, no wise men; no Mary or Joseph; no little town of Bethlehem or choirs of angels or silent nights. It's "Joy to the World", which you'll notice, if you run through the words in your head, does not include a single specific reference to the birth of Christ. The more I've pondered its words, the more I believe it would make a better Advent hymn than a Christmas carol, because it's more about Christ's second coming than about his first.

When Isaac Watts wrote 'Joy to the World', he wasn't thinking about Christmas; nor was he thinking about Advent. Instead he was reflecting on Psalm 98

as part of his hymn series *The Psalms of David Imitated*. Watts wrote this series for his congregational church in London, which sang only the text of the Psalms in their worship services. Watts' passionate belief that the church should sing songs explicitly about Jesus led him to write a series of over 300 hymns, loosely paraphrasing the Psalms and recasting them in the light of Christ.

Isaac Watts was one of the great hymn writers in church history, and I guess nothing shows that better than the fact that he wrote one of his most famous hymns by accident.

When he arrived at the second half of Psalm 98, he read the following words:

Make a joyful noise unto the Lord, all the earth: make a loud noise, and rejoice, and sing praise...

With trumpets and sound of cornet make a joyful noise before the Lord, the King.

Let the sea roar, and the fulness thereof; the world, and they that dwell therein.

Let the floods clap their hands: let the hills be joyful together

Before the Lord; for he cometh to judge the earth: with righteousness shall he judge the world, and the people with equity.

After absorbing this image of the whole earth bursting into song because the Lord comes to judge the earth, Watts wrote the four verses of 'Joy to the World', riffing off of Psalm 98 with his own words:

Joy to the world! The Lord is come; let earth receive her King;

let every heart prepare him room, and heaven and nature sing...

While fields and floods, rocks, hills, and plains repeat the sounding joy...

He rules the world with truth and grace, and makes the nations prove the glories of his righteousness, and wonders of his love.



The words are not simply focused on the **joy** we experience as we look back and celebrate the incarnation, they also encourage us to look forward, to discover the **joy** we can find by reflecting on our future hope, the second coming of Christ.

Throughout both the Old and New Testament it is Christ who is the cause of celebration, the one who elicits all the earth to 'shout for joy.'

Entering the season of Advent is not an abstract spiritual exercise divorced from our daily lives.

The Church's seasons invite us to connect the reality of our lives and our world with their truths.

During Advent we confess that we live in a world in need of a king, of justice, and of joy.

We only have to watch the news for about 30 seconds to know that our world, in its struggles, its sorrows, and its sin, is longing and crying out for a Saviour to come.

And more personally, during Advent we admit our own need for our king, for his justice and his joy to invade our lives.

We all long for sickness to be healed, for estrangement to end, for justice to finally arrive. The word of hope during Advent is that we know the end of the story; our King will bring a final and lasting justice and joy to our world.



## How to read the Bible

**READING** the Bible is so much easier if you just follow some simple steps and get prepared.

AND, as you delve into it, you will find that you are more familiar with the Bible than you expected: extracts crop up in everything from Shakespeare to Hollywood movies; and it has inspired musicians, historical figures and campaigners.

The Bible is complex. It's not one book but a collection of 66 books, split into two sections: the Old Testament and the New Testament.

All of the books are divided into chapters and verses. People often find it easier to begin at the opening of the New Testament, which starts about three-quarters of the way through.

The New Testament starts with four accounts of the life of Jesus Christ, known as the Gospels (which means 'good news').

They include eye-witness reports of what happened. Matthew and John were among Jesus' 12 closest followers. Here you can read about what Jesus did and said – his profound teaching, how he healed people of sickness and how he challenged the authorities.

The Gospels also tell us about Jesus' birth, his death by crucifixion and how he came back to life and then returned to heaven.

So, starting with a Gospel introduces you to the person of Jesus and the basics of Christian belief.

If anyone asks me where to start, I always suggest what was suggested to me; the Gospel of Luke, then go onto the Book of Acts (both in the New Testament). Being written by the same author, they flow well together, and are the story of Jesus followed by the start of the early church—in other words, what happened next.

A good next step is to read some of the teaching given to the early Christian Church. Much of the New Testament is a series of letters written by early Christian leaders such as Paul.

He travelled around the lands of the eastern Mediterranean, telling people about Jesus. He then wrote to newly-established churches and individuals to encourage them in their beliefs. Letters such as Philippians or Colossians are short, bite-sized items full of advice about how to live a Christian life.

Getting to grips with the whole Bible takes some time, but it will be worth the effort!!

Start with a plan

Pick a time: a time of day you would like to spend time reading the Bible. Then try to stick to it.

It's much easier to commit to regularly reading your Bible if you get into a good habit—and finding the right time of day sure helps!

Pick a place: Many people find it helpful to find a quiet and comfortable place to sit and read the Bible.

Pray first: Ask God to be with you! And He will open your mind to what He wants to teach you—honest! This will help you understand what you are reading and its relevance to you.

Pick some tools: Set up your chosen place so you have everything you may want at hand: a pen, highlighters, your journal (a book to record your thoughts - see next paragraph for more details), and your tea or coffee (of course).

But remember: you do not need anything but an open Bible!

Start slow

Start by reading small portions of the Bible at first; a long passage or one chapter a day. Read for about 10–15 minutes.

Don't overwhelm yourself by reading an entire book in one sitting. Savour each word, each phrase. Take time to think about what you read. Meditate on it.

Pray about it.

Even write about it –journaling is a wonderful way to express your thoughts, feelings, prayers and praises.

It is not necessary to be a scholar to enjoy and understand the Bible.

Read and re-read it and find lifechanging and inspirational ideas. I have read some passages hundreds of times, and still I find I learn something new.

There are small Bible Reading notes in booklet form, such as UCB Word for Today, which will provide you with someone else's insight into a verse for each day. Some people find this helpful, and can be used in addition to reading your Bible.

If you might find this helpful, do ask Lin or Sandy Cooper and they can supply you with them.

The Bible is more than just a good book, it is the Book of Life, which leads to life in Jesus Christ. It enables us to know God in all his majesty and glory. The Bible has insights into how to live, how to cope with difficulties and how to forgive. It explains who Jesus Christ is and shows us what God is like. Our Lord will speak to you personally through what you read.

Don't pick up your phone or the newspaper first thing in the morning... pick up your Bible instead!

It's guaranteed to change your day for the better!

#### **Alternatives**

There are other ways of course to read the Bible and to study it, for example you could join one of our Discipleship Groups: *Getting to know Jesus more*. Ask Regan about this to find out when and where to join in.

Lauren, who confirmed her life to following Jesus in November, has found a way to read and study the Bible that suits her. So, I've asked her to share her way with us as well.

### Girl Gone Verse Mapping by Lauren Joyce

How did I get into verse mapping? Being a newly practicing Christian, I found myself uneducated, of not knowing what the bible entailed.

Of course, God communicates his will, his laws, his nature, and we have his teachings and parables and his saving purpose to humanity.

The bible teaches us about a lot of things and there is much I still need to understand and learn!

I never really knew where to start in the bible and it was a bit daunting at first, but I realised that it wasn't as bad as I thought!

So how did I start verse mapping? Well, in simple terms, I just opened the bible... it was that easy!

#### What is verse mapping?

For those who haven't heard the term 'Verse Mapping' it's a tool that I personally find very useful when wanting to dig deeper into a piece of scripture. You can do this by yourself or simply in a small group.

#### How can I verse Map?

- 1. First and foremost, quieten your heart and PRAY! I say this because when it comes to studying it's knowing who your teacher is, The Holy Spirit will guide you and be with you when you study; no matter where you begin or how much you know already, the Holy Spirit will teach you something! As it says in PROVERBS 3:5 'trust the lord with all your heart, do not lean on your own understanding'.
- 2. Pick the verse you'd like to study, this can be a piece of scripture that stands out to you, you could be drawn to this piece of scripture, or you just want to know what this scripture means!
- **3.** Look at different versions of the verse you picked out (ESV, NIV, KJV) then write both versions down (there is an app you can you use called 'Bible Hub' this will give you different bible versions).
- 4. When you have written down both versions, look for any words that are repeated or stand out to you.

You can also highlight them as well as writing them down.

- 5. Then look up the definitions of the words that stood out for you; including the Greek and Hebrew translations.
- **6.** Find other related verses in the bible (optional).
- 7. If you come across a verse and you find you have questions, then pop down any questions you have.



This may give you a prompt to investigate deeper!

- 8. After you have done all the above, think about what you can start doing and stop doing as a response. (There is no right or wrong answer, this is personal to you and what you feel this verse is teaching you)
- **9. Think** about things you can do to praise God for.
- 10. What is your prayer response to what you have just learnt?

SOMETIMES verse mapping isn't just about writing things down, you can be creative if you prefer, you may find yourself seeing an image when going over the verse, so why don't you try something different and create what you see on paper?

You never know it could help in your mapping! There really is no wrong or right way of doing this.

#### What difference has it made?

Overall, verse mapping has become my friend, it has taught me so much and still teaches me every day, I have taken a lot of things away from the bible and looked at myself and how I act, the bible has helped me unmask my own demons and helped me become a better person through knowing the word.

I get a closeness of God's presence because I find the time to just sit with him, to let him guide me to messages and teachings he wants me to learn.

I hope you all find this useful and get an urge to start verse mapping!
