THE SEASON OF LENT lasts for forty days (not including Sundays). It is a time when we reflect and prepare for the celebrations of Easter.

SOME people fast, eat frugally or give up treats following the example of Jesus, who fasted for forty days in the wilderness.

People also give to charity, set aside time to study the Bible and meet with other Christians to reflect on Jesus' life and prepare for the events of Holy Week and Easter. We are planning to hold a 'Lent Course', so that we can do just that.

Ash Wednesday is the first day of Lent. Ashes made from palm crosses are blessed and are used to make crosses on people's foreheads. The custom dates back to the middle ages.

Ash Wednesday services (10am and 7.30pm on 22nd February) set the tone for Lent, with sombre readings and hymns and a focus on penitence = saying sorry for and turning away from sin.

Well, all this got me thinking about what I might want to hear from God as I prepare for the season of Lent.

So, I thought I'd try to encapsulate my thoughts and longings in a letter.

A letter from God... to me, and to you.

Dear Daughter or Son.

ON Ash Wednesday, if you're in church, the minister will invite you to the observance of a 'Holy Lent' and mark your forehead with the ashes of repentance.

Let me be very clear about this at the outset: I love you so much. I delight in you. I cherish you. For ever.

Here are a few more things I want you to comprehend:

Despite what you've been taught, 'holy' does not mean pure and unearthly. 'Sin' does not mean breaking my rules and making me mad. 'Penitence' does not mean listing and wallowing in all the ways you're wrong and bad. 'Repentance' does not mean promising to do better, to stay out of trouble.

Please think about these words a new way, on Ash Wednesday and every other day going forward.

What if you only sin when you refuse healing and cling to brokenness? When you use those sharp broken edges to hurt yourself and others?

What if holiness is when you choose to be whole, even though you're terrified?

When you embrace and enfold those pieces of yourself that you've lopped off to fit into the moulds of others?

What if 'penitence' is when you see yourself clearly, and know, speak, and live from your heart?

What if 'repentance' is remembering your true self in all your messy glory?

What if, this Lent, instead of focusing on the ways you're not good enough and the ways you fall short, you commit to your own healing?

I was there at the Big Bang, enlivening every particle, atom and molecule. You are made of me, and through me you are connected to everything and everyone.

I am everywhere, my glorious child. You swim in me and I in you.

This means, my dearest daughter, my dearest son, when you let yourself be healed, your healing heals the world. And when you cling to your brokenness, the world stays a little more broken than it needs to be. Your healing is important and necessary. You think your healing is selfish. That's incorrect. Your healing is crucial. I'm using that word deliberately, dearheart.

Your healing **IS** the crux – where you and I come together.

This Lent, the only fasts I want from you are these:

- Fast from distractions that allow you to stay wounded and broken.
- Fast from believing you're not good enough.
- Fast from making yourself small, and nice, and silent.
- Fast from all judgment, especially of yourself.

This Lent, make space for me to flow into you and through you.

Befriend your fear, your anger, and your sadness.

They are a deep source of nourishment and strength.

Let your love go free.

Let your joy be unconfined.

Oh, my hearts delight, my child, healing isn't complicated, and it's always available.

All you have to do is tap into it, and I will make my life-giving water of healing and wholeness flow.

You know this.

But it's so easy to forget, isn't it? All you have to do is let me clear out the dams and the rubbish, the resentments and identities and old, too-small skins, that keep you stuck and stagnant.

Relax your heart armour just a little. And then allow yourself to flow, child. That's all you have to do. *I'll do the rest*.

This Ash Wednesday, let those ashes symbolize our unending connection, a connection so easy to forget and so simple to strengthen.

When the priest wipes those gritty ashes on your forehead and says, 'Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return,' celebrate your elemental oneness with this dear, dirty earth and with me. I am in those ashes, in the dust, in the stars, and in you.



My daughter, my son, I need you! You're the only you I created. So, please, let yourself be the creation I made you to be.

You don't need someone outside yourself telling you how to live.

Trust yourself. Trust your heart. Trust me. I've got you.

I LOOKED at her face, all wrinkled and bright,

I questioned her more, as try as I might,

I couldn't imagine these shoes of prayer.

New voter ID requirement



If you are voting at a polling station on 4 May, you will now need to bring <u>voter ID as well as your polling card</u>. All South Gloucestershire councillors and Town and Parish councillor positions are up for election. Make sure you don't miss out on your chance to vote. If you have turned 18, moved house or changed your name, you can <u>register and update your details online</u>. You can also <u>apply for a postal vote</u>.



NB: Bus passes count as photo ID but if you don't have any photo ID you can apply online, for a free voter ID document known as a Voter Authority Certificate, from late January from gov.uk.

You can also get a paper application by post, from the council or call the helpline 0800 328 0280.

The deadline to get the paper application to be able to vote in the May elections (should we need to) is 25 April. These rules will apply to UK general elections from October as well.
