# MAY YOUR YEAR be filled with joy!

AS IF from nowhere, **2024** has well and truly arrived. It's got nothing to do with perfect vision, although wouldn't it be fascinating to see the year ahead in all its technicolour glory.

Again, I have to say, 'Where did 2023 go?' It feels like I blinked in March and then found myself preparing for Christmas and then trying to find a New Year's resolution, that I hadn't previously attempted and failed at.

Maybe, you are the determined type, and after all the indulging at Christmas, you name your New Year's resolution and will take yourself off to the gym or join the 'Couch to 5K' running program or maybe choose to join a slimming group.

Maybe, you plan to buy some healthy eating cookbooks, and plan to drag your family along as, 'it will be good for them'!

Perhaps you will stop smoking, cut down on how much you drink, eat less meat, use less single use plastic, drive less and walk more, watch less telly and talk more, have a physical conversation rather than an *emoji* conversation on social media. The resolution list is endless, and would you believe, there are even Apps to help you achieve them.

We choose to take up a New Year's resolution because it will benefit us, they are positive steps in improving our life in one way or another, physically or mentally. We might not find joy in them per se... but we often find joy in the planning of them. But when, in our looking ahead to the new and improved us, do we consider our spirituality?

That part of us that constantly searches for the meaning in life, the purpose for our existence, the 'more and beyond' than the present world can offer us, that connection with God... creator of the physical world we experience.

The sort of thing that, trust me, is guaranteed to bring you joy! Remember December's Open Space that encouraged us to read our Bibles?? If you didn't start then... why not start now!!??!!

Advent maybe behind us but we should try to hang onto the periods of stillness and quiet that we tried to create in our waiting.

Moments of pausing and reflecting on where we have seen God throughout the day, learning to recognise God's actions in ourselves and others as well as how we are being blessed.

**Spirituality** is beyond our physical or material needs, it is a lifestyle that feeds our connectedness with God.

A simple and effective way of engaging our spirituality is by praying the Daily Examen. Saint Ignatius of Loyola developed the practice of stopping and reflecting on the day, noticing where God has been, praising God and looking forward to tomorrow.

He believed that this was a gift from God that everyone should experience.

IF YOU would like to unwrap this gift of post-Christmas, here is a brief guide... Find a quiet place and sit comfortably.

#### 1. Become aware of God's presence.

Look back on the events of the day.

The day may seem confusing to you – a blur, a jumble, a muddle. Ask God to bring clarity and understanding.

#### 2. Review the day with gratitude.

Gratitude is the foundation of our relationship with God. Walk through your day in the presence of God and note its joys and delights. Focus on the day's gifts. Look at the work you did, the people you interacted with. What did you receive from these people? What did you give them?

Pay attention to small things—God is in the details. Continued on page 2>



## MAY YOUR YEAR be filled with joy!

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### 3. Pay attention to your emotions.

One of St. Ignatius's great insights was that we detect the presence of the Spirit of God in the movements of our emotions. Reflect on the feelings you experienced during the day. Boredom? Elation? Resentment? Compassion? Anger? Confidence? What is God saying through these feelings?

4. Choose one feature of the day and pray from it.

Ask the Holy Spirit to direct you to something during the day that God thinks is particularly important.

It may involve a feeling—positive or negative.

It may be a significant encounter with another person or a vivid moment of pleasure or peace.

Or it may be something that seems rather insignificant. Look at it, pray about it. Allow the prayer to arise spontaneously from your heart—whether intercession, praise, repentence, or gratitude.

#### 5. Look toward tomorrow.

Ask God to give you light for tomorrow's challenges.

Pay attention to the feelings that surface as you survey what's coming up. Allow these feelings to turn into prayer. Seek God's guidance. Ask God for help and understanding. Pray for hope. Pray for the joy of the Lord to fill you to overflowing. St. Ignatius encouraged people to talk to Jesus like a friend.

End the Daily Examen with a conversation with Jesus.

Ask forgiveness for your sins. Ask for his protection and help. Ask for his wisdom about the questions you have and the problems you face. Do all this in the spirit of gratitude. Your life is a gift, and it is adorned with gifts from God.' www.ignatianspirituality.com

DON'T be shy, if you need help just ask. Equally, let me know your experiences of praying the Examen. If you prefer to be guided through the Daily Examen then there are several Apps available to download. Praying is simply 'talking to God.'

Adverts and medics tell us that 'it's good to talk', well imagine how much more stupendously and wonderfully better it is to TALK TO GOD! What joy it is to sit, or walk, work or dance in his presence as you pray. It's possible anytime, anywhere, any way!! Talk AND listen, and through it, in the presence of God in Jesus, your JOY will grow and sustain you.

# Ways of Giving to God

### THROUGH HIS CHURCH...

**B**EING 'Thankful and Grateful' to God for all that He has freely given to us, both in provision for all our needs AND in Jesus, means that we, like Him, can become **Generous** people.

Generous with our time; Generous with our love; Generous in our speaking; Generous in our thinking; Generous in our ways; Generous in sharing what we have.

In other words, we become Generous, just as God is Generous with us. Our gratitude to God overflows into Generosity.

Your Church, which is not just me or the ministry team, but all of us as the Body of Christ in this place, are called to make Christ known and loved.

To do that, here in Soundwell, in all the places we spend time, and also in reaching out to support others in need wherever that might be... that work does cost money. Some of the costs are obvious to see, like heat and light in Church and the maintenance of the buildings. Other costs like paying our 'Parish Share', means clergy are recruited, trained and provided to parishes, along with essential on-going training and resources that our Church needs to keep itself fresh, relevant – and growing.

This building was paid for by our forebears many years ago.

It is only still here today, because it has been carefully maintained by generations of faithful Christians here in Soundwell.

Without our Generosity, the Church collapses. And with it, all the amazing work the Holy Spirit enables us to do in the Lord's name here, and further afield.

There are many ways to Give to God through your Church.

You can put money into the collection plates in Church or use the QR code displayed on the stands to give using a smart phone, or use the donations paypoint

machine near the Font to give from a bank card or credit card or from your phone.

But, to enable us as a church to be able to budget and be secure in the knowledge we can pay our bills, we highly commend the first of the following two options:

THIS is a direct debit scheme from your bank account each month which enables you to give regularly and review annually and also means no scrabbling for cash or needing to

The majority of us choose to give in this way, as it helps us as individuals and it is a huge help to your church—less time spent counting, having to carry less cash is safer for our treasurer, and also the church receives the 'gift aid' income monthly.

PGS also prompts us to review our giving each year, which many of us welcome as otherwise we might forget.

In this way, we can think this through with God in prayer each year—about our response to God's goodness through his church—and it's a joy in thinking all things through with God in prayer at any time!

#### **Collection Envelopes**

YOU can enclose your donation every week and just take them all to Church when you can. It's also important to review what you give.

But there is no reminder with envelopes, so you have to manage that yourself—so why not do this annually when you receive your new set of envelopes?

# St Stephens Stars



**G**ENTLY turning way up on high Stars glittering, shiny and bright Just like that very special star One very dark Bethlehem night.

LIKE ME, I am sure that you have all enjoyed the display of stars that has been a feast for the eyes over the Christmas season.

The original stars we started hanging for Christmas, came from an idea by Wayne Pearce, and some were created by many of us here, under his guidance, about 15 years ago. Over the years as stars were hung up and taken down, they became tangled and tattered, and the number of useable stars dwindled. In November 2022 as they emerged from storage again, Lisa decided it might be good to think about a new display of stars for Christmas 2023.

And so began a long period of planning –from last November until this November, yes, a whole year –to come up with a display design, create the base of the stars, source the materials needed to cover the stars, get folk together to decorate the stars and finally have a team in place to put the stars together, in their sequences, before finally hanging them in place, high up in the church!

We have to thank Wayne (for a second time) for creating the wooden star frames that we then covered with tinsel.



He had the use of a laser cutter to produce approximately 80 stars for us, with the burning wood causing quite a smell!

Many meetings took place and multiple emails were exchanged between the three of us to come up with the final designs and quantities we needed for the display.

While we have many new stars this year, we also were able to re-use some of the larger ones from previous years, and set about 'titivating' them with some extra tinsel.

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Talking of tinsel—I never realised how many different widths and thicknesses of tinsel there are!!

But of course we were very particular as to what width we wanted to cover the smaller stars!

This entailed quite a number of hours trawling the internet and searching through Christmas décorations at multiple shops to find just what we wanted!

I had a very serious case of tinseltis, while working out the best way to affix the tinsel onto the stars, in a way that will hopefully make them durable for many years to come!

How thankful am I that I have a craft room that I can make as much mess as I like in, because oh my goodness tinsel is messy!

Some of it did seem to follow me throughout the house though!!

While on a tinsel hunt, I found some perfect, very glittery stars to go in the display.

It seemed that the store (B&M) only ever put two or three of these stars on display at a time, so this meant multiple trips to the stores (Fishponds, Filton and Cribbs) to get the 16 that we have on display!!

I also managed to grab 7 large stars, half price, from Wilko before they closed their doors for good.

All very time consuming!!

I have been delighted (and at times frustrated) to have been part of this process throughout the last year, and it is a real joy and blessing to see the final result—over 100 stars shining brightly for Jesus.
