
Our refreshments after the conclusion of our evening, included an amazing choice of several cheeses and biscuits! *Yummy*!

Giving v Church Expenses Last 3 Months





REMEMBRANCE DAY is held each year and 2 minutes silence observed at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month. This commemorates the moment hostilities ceased; bringing WWI to an end in 1918, when the guns finally fell silent after years of warfare.

Here in Britain, many families had a son, brother or father or uncle whose life had been lost, or suffered injury serving in the army, nearly every hamlet, village, town or city was affected.

Even today, 100+ years later, war memorials still exist in most places.

The commemoration of those who died is marked by the wearing of a poppy– a ubiquitous flower that grew on battlefields, especially in France where the main battles were fought.

Poppies were common, flourishing in the soil churned up by the fighting and shelling, and provided Canadian doctor John McCrae with inspiration for his poem: *In Flanders Fields*', which he wrote in Ypres in 1915.

In 1918, in response to McCrae's poem, American humanitarian Moina Michael wrote: And now the Torch and Poppy Red, we wear in honour of our dead'.

She campaigned to make the poppy a symbol of remembrance of those who had died in the war.

Artificial poppies were first sold in Britain in 1921 to raise money for the Earl Haig Fund in support of former servicemen and the families of those who had died in the conflict.

They were supplied by Anna Guérin, who had been manufacturing the flowers in France to raise money for war orphans. Selling poppies proved so popular that in 1922 the British Legion founded a factory, staffed by disabled ex-servicemen, to produce its own.

It continues to do so today. World War I was meant to be the war that ended all wars, but sadly it hasn't worked out that way.

Why not think about sponsoring one or more of the new stars!!??


There are likely to be around **120** stars hanging from the ceiling to decorate our church and to make it shine for Jesus.

HOW CAN WE PRAY for what is happening at the moment in Israel and Gaza

WHAT we are witnessing today in the hostilities between Israel and Hamas is the worst since the conflict began and is devastating. Thousands have already died and been injured, hostages are being held, homes destroyed, communities flattened.

Watching on with horror, we want to respond with prayer but perhaps are unsure about what we should be praying for in this difficult situation. As someone from the region I offer the following suggestions which I hope will help guide you.

Pray for yourself

When you come to prayer, pray first for yourself. Pray that your heart won't separate Israel and Palestine, Palestine and Israel, so that you enter before God totally wanting God's love and goodness to be released in the situation.

Pray against fear and blame This conflict has been going on for the last 76 years. Pray that people will begin to see one another as fellow human beings and will not fear or blame each other. Pray against the spirit of fear and blame.

Pray for the families

Pray for the families and loved ones of those who have been taken hostage and those who have lost their lives or been injured, on both sides. Pray for those who are worried, anxious and grieving.

Pray for an end to the conflict

Pray for an immediate end to the hostility. Pray for people to stop using words of hatred, which undermine each other and make the other side seem less than human. The end of hostility is not just about stopping the firing of bullets, rockets and army incursion – it starts first with the heart and then the mind and the way we speak about each other.

Pray for the peace-makers

Pray for all those who are working for peace, on both sides. Pray that they will take their call to be peace-makers very seriously. Within that, pray for the local churches, Jewish and Arabic.

Pray for faithful Muslims and for Jewish leaders who will talk the conversation of peace and of justice. This conflict needs to come to an end and you need peace-makers to begin that conversation.

Pray for those under siege

Pray that the siege in Gaza will be short, especially in lack of essential amenities: food, water, and utilities.

Gaza has suffered for so long and cannot sustain further suffering. Pray too for the Israeli populations, especially around Gaza, that they will not continue to live in fear, staying in protected areas of their buildings and bomb shelters, but they will be able to move in freedom.

Pray for the children

Remember always the children, who cannot articulate what is going on. Pray for those being held hostage and those living with great fear of bombardment on both sides.



Pray for clarity

This is a complex and difficult conflict. But the complexity can be dealt with if we stop saying it is complex and just begin to say it is difficult because when we say 'complex' we cannot deal with it.

So, pray for clarity for how to move forward for both sides. Lisa
