

# Creation, creator and creativity.







**W**E are all familiar with the story of creation, as told in the book of Genesis. The simple truth of the biblical creation story is that God is the author of creation.

GOD was very pleased with his creation. Six times during the process of creating, God stopped, observed his handiwork, and saw that it was good. On final inspection of all that he had made, God regarded it as 'very good'.

Back in March, I paid a visit to Bath Abbey to look at an exhibition called 'Threads through Creation' that is currently on tour and being exhibited at cathedrals throughout the country. As someone who is interested in all things creative, I was keen to see how the biblical story of creation could be depicted in the medium of embroidery, as an alternative interpretation of the written word.

'Threads through Creation' is a spectacular sequence of twelve huge textile panels, created by Jacqui Parkinson. Jacqui's Christian faith underpins her work.

This is the second set of panels she has created, and a third set is underway.

'Threads through Creation' took a total of three years work, miles of thread and unbelievable sewing on a huge scale: expressing God's love with around eight million stitches!

Interestingly, each panel starts with an old bedsheet, usually French linen. Jacqui says she 'likes the rougher textured ones, the 'slubby' ones, the ones that are patched and darned'. She likes the thought that:

these sheets have seen all kinds of human emotions, holding memories of generations, from birth to death, and that the sorrows and joys are then part of her work'. She likes the idea of 'taking the ordinary and making it special and spectacular? And my goodness, she certainly achieves that!

To this humble base she adds layers of silk and threads to create her works of art. It's an exuberant, colourful retelling of the creation story from the book of Genesis, a retelling which many of those who look at it, find both moving and breath-taking, myself included.

Viewers are treated to a wonderful variety of colours, shapes, patterns - and of course lots of creatures!

The panels will be on display at Wells Cathedral from 18th October until 27th November. If you are interested, and able to, I urge you to take a look at this incredible labour of love. Jacqui Parkinson's cathedral exhibitions are a leap of faith. Creating and touring is very costly. And she receives no public funding. When she starts a new project, it is not fully funded; she simply trusts that sufficient money will come in to pay for making it and getting it out on tour for people to see.

Creation in the Bible means much more than bringing something into being. It also means sustaining and caring for that which has been created by our dependable Creator.

### Rhythms of life

SO many of us now live on the earth in towns and cities, where our wonder and awe of God's creation has dissipated. Vast numbers of us live in a world that is devoid of the natural rhythms of life: many people starting and ending the day with brightly lit 24/7 screens. Few of us are aware of the natural rhythm of creation; the planting and harvesting of crops – the returning of day followed by night – the turning of the tides. And maybe we don't even sense our own rhythms: our need for light and dark to help regulate our internal circadian clock – the beating of our heart – the taking in and the releasing of breath.

But if we engage with creation we can recover the rhythms that we need, to live well. To value 'now' – this moment – with a sense of reverence.

#### The now

WE need to recognise and value the present moment – the only time we can be certain of. The space deliberately left: finishing a meal with room for more – completing work with time to dawdle home – finishing a task to have room for play. Ending the day with energy and time to thank God for 'time well spent'.

To move more slowly – to enjoy the beauty of the world.

To be in 'green pastures – beside quiet waters' (Psalm 23:2-3), as God desires for us.

In moments of rest, knowing our time really is in our Father's hands. That there's sufficient time to accomplish all that we need to, with time to rest.

Holidays and 'time off' give us 'time to waste', if you like, but it is also a time to rest, and appreciate our surroundings and take the opportunity to reflect and give thanks, to our Creator God, with a grateful heart.

We are privileged to have so many documentaries on plants and wild-life from all over the world on our screens, but the natural world around us doesn't happen on such a large scale or at the same pace.

### **Using our senses**

IT takes time to 'see'. To practise looking. To stop and notice the ants scurrying around at our feet, to smell the damp earth after rain, to touch the rose petal, to hear the bird song. To savour and relish each mouthful of food. To watch, listen, touch, breathe deeply and truly experience all that we should.

I love to hear the birds singing in my garden, and when I go out walking, and recognise quite a few of their 'songs'.

In May I was fortunate enough to have a holiday to Australia, where I had time to listen to, and watch, some very different birds to those I am used to!

I have to say that many of them weren't very tuneful – screeching cockatoos, large flocks of noisy chattering lorikeets and the laughing kookaburra, to name a few! But... I had 'time to waste', to look, listen, appreciate and soak up every new experience that came my way during my travels to the 'land down under'!

We also need to remind ourselves that we are part of God's creation. Even when we don't feel worthy of his pleasure, remember that God made us and is pleased with us and we are of great worth to him:

'You are precious in my sight, and honoured, and I love you' (Isaiah 43:4).

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We're created to be in a relationship with our Creator and that means to be full of thanks and full of worship. It can be our only response;


'You made me so happy, God: I saw your work and I shouted for joy. How magnificent your work, God! How profound your thoughts!' (Psalm 92:4-5).
